Carole's Corner

SELECTIVE FOCUS

Selective focus is a technique to intentionally put part of the image in sharpest focus and the other parts out of focus. It is achieved by the choice of aperture. It is commonly used for close-up images and portraits. It is also a popular for its artistic effects.

The choice of aperture keeps the rest of the image out of focus. So it is very important to focus directly on the main subject. The main subject can be located anywhere in the composition.

Here is how it works. Aperture means opening. Every lens has an opening through which the light enters. A large, or wide, opening produces a shallow depth of field, which means much loss of focus behind and in front of the focused area. Large apertures are f/stops such as f/2.8, f/4, and f/5.6.

F/2.8 is a larger aperture size than the others, because f/stops are really fractions. F/2.8 lets in more light than f/5.6. Confusion about apertures clears up by referring to them by one number and forgetting they are fractions. It may help to remember simply that a small number produces more blurriness in front of and behind the point focused upon.

The coordinated shutter speed must be considered. If it is slow, a tripod is recommended. If no shutter speed is available for the chosen wide aperture, the solutions are to change the ISO or to add a neutral density filter.

Choice of lens makes a big difference. The physics of telephoto and macro lenses allow them to work the best for the selective focus technique. Wide angle lenses are made to keep everything sharp.

Sports photographers benefit from the telephoto's inherent shallower depth of field. The blurrier, less distracting backgrounds of the spectators or signs around the field are typical of many sports photos.

Portraits of people and animals are frequently taken with a telephoto lens and a large lens openings (small numbered apertures). Flower portraits with a dreamy, artistic look are the result of selective focus. Placing the main subject among farther away objects yields artistic images. For example, a flower or zoo animal behind a foreground chain link fence. The farther away from the main subject, the more abstract the unfocused areas become.

Experiments using the camera's aperture-priority mode will yield selective focus images. The camera's choice of larger lens openings for the automatic modes of Portrait or Flower or Close-up produces similar results.

In sum, using small numbered apertures is the key to selective focus.
