#### Look for the Best of the Best

"We all photograph for different reasons and we all do things differently, but I think edits (especially the first edits done relatively soon after shooting) should be selections, not ratings. My own edit process goes much more quickly because I'm not looking for every single image that meets some basic minimal technical standard. I'm looking for the ones that make me lean in."

David duChemin has some great <u>perspectives</u> on why you should be ruthless when choosing which photos to edit and print. Nancy Armstrong was lucky enough to participate in a week-long workshop last summer put on by David and Dave Brosha, two well-known Canadian photographers. They spent the entire week learning how to shoot, cull and edit for a specific, defined end product.

# HIGH KEY AND LOW KEY IMAGES

High key images have light subjects on a whitish background. Low key images are noticeably dark overall with a dark background. The terms of high and low are fancy names for the image's overall "look." These are not to be confused with underexposed or overexposed images. There is no camera setting for low and high key photography.



The purpose of creating such images is the mood created by the light or dark look. Dark images can be mysterious, gloomy, scary, sad, etc. Light images have a clean look with a sense of happiness, youth, peace, calm, etc.

Portraits are popular subjects for high key photography. An example is a child dressed in white or pastel clothes sitting on a white chair next to a white dog and posed on white background paper. A mood of the peaceful innocence of youth results from the white on white even when there is some color in the image.

A white egg photographed on white paper with a white background is a high key image. It is difficult to find the right exposure and lighting to make the egg stand out from the background. There needs to be enough shadowing of the contours to create the 3-dimensional look. A high key image is also possible with landscapes and buildings. The result can be described as making the colors so muted that the image looks softly black and white and ethereal,

Low key images need to be lighted well enough for the main subject to be visible. There should be sufficient lighting for the edges of the subject to be visible enough to separate the subject from the dark background and also show some of the details. Low key portraits are an interesting and unique option for photographers instead of the usual sunlight or flash portraits.



The exposure for low and high key photography is a challenge. The camera's light meter will try to brighten the dark images and darken the light images. The photographer can use the plus or minus feature of exposure compensation or manual settings for aperture (f/stop) and shutter speed.
