CAROLE'S CORNER

BACKLIGHT

The backlight discussed in this article is when the main light source is hitting the subject matter from the back and not the front or the side. Since there is no photo without light, it is an important and basic decision for the photographer to be aware of the direction of the main light.

Beginning photographers may try to follow the basic camera advice of not shooting into the light. This is not always possible. There will come a time when any photographer takes a picture of people standing in front of a window and is disappointed by the underexposed people and the overly bright window.

When the camera is pointing in the general direction of the main light source, the light meter is usually fooled by so much bright light behind the main subject and therefore darkens the exposure. When the human eye squints in bright light, the camera's eye will also squint by decreasing the aperture (lens opening). The result is either a total silhouette or a dark and underexposed subject.

A potential solution is to use a plus 1 or 2 exposure compensation, either manually or with a backlight scene mode. This lets more light into the camera and lightens the main subject. The downside is that the background will be brighter and may look over-exposed.

A flash can be used to brighten the subject although a flash cannot always overcome a bright background. A flash can be used either indoors and outdoors to make the subject lighter.

Dramatic silhouettes can result from backlighting. The shape of a person, head or hairdo, dog, camel, steeple, tree, etc., can turn into an attention-grabbing subject. The silhouette technique is complicated by the difficulty of producing a background that does not look over-exposed.

When the sun is included in the composition, it can be given a starburst effect by using a very small aperture, such as f/22.

A drawback of including the sun in the composition is flares. When the sun's rays hit the lens, they cause weird, distracting shapes of bright light on the image. Flares can be prevented by using a lens hood or by blocking the lens from the sun's rays with the hand. A lens hood is recommended outdoors, anyway.

It is dangerous to look directly at the sun through the viewfinder.
